Unit I Anatomy 12 HRS

Proportion and disproportion of human figure. Figure types and variations- normal figures measurements and its importance. Standard body measurements for children, ladies and gents. Sequence of taking body measurements for various age groups, standardization of body measurements.

Unit II Introduction to Illustration

12 HRS

Introduction to Fashion Illustration its elements and importance in fashion Industry. Basic-Ten& Twelve Head Figure (Female): Stick figure, Block, Mechanical Figure Flesh & Contour Figure, Fashion Figure Elongation and Distinction between real and fashion figure.

Unit III Basic Figure Forms

12 HRS

Drawing Torso, Legs, Arms, Hands, Feet, Figure Movement: Rotation in Arch, Leg Poses, Arm Movement, Foreshortening: Legs and Arms, Different Poses of figure.

Unit IV Drawing Various View

12 HRS

Front View, Side View, 3/4 View and Back View fashion figure (Mechanical and Flesh Figure) to

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understand the 3-D perspective. Basic Rendering Techniques- Coloring Medium, Figure Rendering, Various Fabric Rendering

Unit V Garment Draping on Figure

12 HRS

Swimwear, Sportswear, Evening wear, Bridal Wear etc., Development of flat Sketches and spec sheet, layout and presentation, Illustrating Pose from reference images. Garments sizing and surveys: women's grading increments reference-area commentaries-selecting a grading system.

SYLLABUS

Unit I Introduction to Textile Testing

12 HRS

Introduction to Textile Testing, The objectives of textile testing, tested quality schemes. Type of testing methods, sample size, various sampling technique. Basic units and conversion such as SI units and B.S. units. Types of measuring and marking tools such as Scale, Measuring tape, various types of curves.

Unit II Atmospheric Condition

12 HRS

Lab condition and standard atmospheric condition for testing lab, introduction to statistical quality control, Mean, Mode, Median, Coefficient of Variation, and Standard Deviation.

Unit III Microscope Testing

12 HR

Textile fiber and its cross sectional and longitudinal view under microscope. Definitions: Fiber, Filament, Yarn, Plied yarn, Cord yarn. Linear density of yarn: Concept, Count or Yarn number, Direct & Indirect System of yarn numbering, Measurement of yarn number. Electronic weighing balance.

Unit IV Testing of Twist

12 HRS

Twist direction& Twist Measurement, effect of twist on yarn and fabric properties, Measurement of twist. Fancy yarns and its application. Classification of fabric on their

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structure, dimensional characteristics of a fabric such as Length, Width, Thickness, EPI, PPI, Fabric weight (GSM), Weight per unit length, Crimp of yarn in fabric, Effect of crimp on the fabric properties, measurement of crimp, pilling of fabrics, Definition, Mechanism of pilling, Factors responsible for pilling, measurement of pilling ICI Pill Box Tester.

Unit V Aesthetic Properties of Fabric

12 HRS

Fabric Handle, Stiffness, Drape, Concept- fabric hand, Objective & subjective evaluation of textiles, Measurement of Stiffness- Shirley stiffness tester, Measurement of drape- Drape meter. Crease Resistance & Crease Recovery, definitions: Crease, Wrinkle. Measurement of crease recovery - Recovery angle.

Apparel Testing:

Dimensional properties of apparel fabrics: relaxation shrinkage, felting shrinkage, swelling shrinkage, contraction. Various faults in garment such as snagging, seam pucker, Seam slippage, Needle cutting, Seam appearance, Bow and Skewness.

Testing of Accessories:

Fusible interlinings, zippers, elastic waist and sewing threads, buttons.

Unit IV Bags, Wallets and Sunglasses

Bags and Wallets: History and significance, anatomy, component parts, materials used, construction, shape, space, color, design and pattern, different styles and types, selection criteria based on end

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application, purchasing behaviour, quality, top brands Sunglasses: History, importance, anatomy, frame materials, glass technology, shapes, functional purpose, aesthetics and styles
